Pearl White, and Red are considered the best colors of the Tesla Model Y based on performance and quality. However, Midnight Silver and Solid Black are considered the worst. Matte finishes may also be more challenging to maintain. Ultimately, personal taste should be the deciding factor when choosing a color for your Tesla Model Y.

Settling on a particular Tesla Model Y exterior color can be challenging, especially when you begin to consider the perks of all the available colors of the famous Y model.

The worst and best colors of the Tesla Model Y depend largely on your point of view or particular expectations.

This blog post will answer the following questions:

I have put this article together to show you the available colors of the <u>Tesla Model</u> Y, ranking them from worst to best based on maintenance, hiding scratches, resale value, and aesthetics during the day or night.

A good place to kick off is to lay out all the available color options for the Model Y.

# Tesla Model Y Color Options

Tesla introduced the Model Y in the fall of 2020 as the world's first compact EV SUV with a pretty affordable price range.

The exterior color options for this particular lineup took inspiration from the <u>Tesla Model</u> 3 since it only offered Tesla's core five exterior color options:

- Solid Black
- Midnight Silver Metallic (no longer being produced)
- Deep Blue Metallic
- Pearl White Multi-Coat
- Red Multi-Coat

The Model Y also offered two interior color options, but our focus in this article is on the exterior color choices, from worst to best.

What precisely sets the Model Y apart from the Model 3 in terms of its exterior is the addition of blacked-out window trim.

#### Best and worst modes Y colors for maintenance

#### The darker Model Y colors are the worst when cleaning or caring for them.

In other words, the best choice for keeping things clean is the lighter color options. With this in mind, you want to consider the Pearl White Multi-Coat and Silver Metallic since they are the lightest Tesla color options.

The silver metallic is discontinued starting with the 2022 model Y, so the pearl white multicoat is the best for hiding imperfections.

#### Best and worst Tesla model Y colors for the appearance

Regarding appearance, the best and worst Tesla Model Y colors are determined in two ways.

Some colors are best seen in daylight or under direct sunlight, while others unravel their glory at night.

The best for appearance during daylight is the Deep Blue Metallic because it is the singular color among the five options with a little extra to reveal when there's bright light.

The blue becomes electric and dazzling when the sunlight smiles brightly, but you get that deep, purple-ish color when there's an overcast.

The deep metallic blue is the worst choice for nighttime elegance, especially when compared with the pearl white multi-coat.

The Pearl White Multi-Coat is redefining the odds because the darker hues are supposed to be best at night in most other car colors.

But with Model Y, the lighter color takes the lead in this category. This is subjective, and I'd appreciate you sharing your opinion in the comments.

The best and worst Tesla Model Y colors for hiding scratches

Scratches not being too revealing is another popular factor when choosing car colors, especially for Tesla.

If you want a Tesla Model Y that won't make scratches noticeable, you must pick light colors.

When scratches occur on the Tesla Model Y, it exposes the primer, which is gray. So with the base coat of the car's body, it becomes more revealing for darker colors.

But with lighter colors, it won't be easy to tell the difference between the car's color and the exposed primer.

## What is the overall worst color for the Tesla Model Y?

The overall worst color for the Tesla Model Y is a matter of taste and your expectations.

For some particular tasks, some colors are better than others.

However, when ranking a list of options, we would have one at the top and another at the bottom.

I'll stand 100% by my opinion that solid black is the overall worst color for a Tesla Model Y. If you've got one already, no hard feelings, but I'm going to tell you why it's not the best

#### choice:

First of all, solid black is an excellent color, but it is \$1000 more than the base price. But even if that isn't significant for some, the fact that the black collects dirt more is discouraging.

Also, when a scratch occurs, it is more evident in the black color than in most other color options.

- 3. Deep Blue Metallic: A vibrant blue shade with metallic elements gives the car a striking and eye-catching appearance.
- 4. Pearl White Multi-Coat: A premium white color with a pearlescent finish that adds a

- luxurious touch. It offers a clean and sophisticated look.
- 5. Red Multi-Coat: A bold, vibrant red color that stands out and makes a statement. It is eye-catching and adds a sense of sportiness to the car.
- 6. Solid White: A standard white option with a clean and classic appearance, balancing simplicity and elegance.

Ultimately, the choice of color depends on personal preference and the look you want for your <u>Tesla Model</u> Y. Consider the different color options in person or using online visualizers to help you make an informed decision that suits your style.

# Wrapping up

The best and worst Tesla Model Y colors are subjective topics. But looking at the reviews we've had on all the color options, I'd rather cast my vote for the Pearl White Multi-Coat as the best color option above every other one.

The white can hide imperfections; it is the least expensive and has the stormtrooper look presented by the blacked-out trim and wheels. It also has a fantastic resale value.

I will probably recommend the red multi-coat if there is a first runner-up.

Multi-coated colors mean that <u>Tesla has put in so much work</u> to generate a fantastic depth in the paint for an improved quality feel.
